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Have Hockey Stick Will Travel: But not quite so far for the 2016 World Cups.

As mentioned once or twice in "Masters Matters", the next World Cups will be held in Australia. If we have any readers who have not yet attended one, they are strongly recommended. As far as I know the event for the younger blokes (O/40 to O/55) in Canberra only includes national teams, so to get there you will have to play for, coach or manage one of the Australian sides. The Newcastle tournament for we slightly older players (O/60 to O/75) includes a Tournament Trophy division which is essentially a second level for more social organisations - those which readily come to mind are England LX, Netherlands Sixtyplussers ("de Zestigplussers"), and Australia's own Southern Cross. There may be a fair amount of competition to get a game with Southern Cross, and the selection method they decide on will be awaited with much interest. There is also the Alliance International Hockey Club, which draws its players from all over the world, and <u>may</u> be looking for Australians to make up team numbers in some age groups.

Now is the time to start planning. The Australian sides are due to be selected during the Cairns tournament, and require pre-nomination. "Masters Matters" will try to let you more in the July issue about both Southern Cross and Alliance.



Those of you who know me would recognize that I am not one of the world's greatest "Handymen" ... although, that said, I have been known to drive a nail or two, when required. It is fortunate that living where we are, every one of our near neighbours knows somebody who can & will "do things". As we all know, there are always things that need fixing. Well after all this time here it has only just occurred to me that I seem to be the only foreign expat walking the local streets. The only time I see another expat, he or she is riding a motorbike wearing a helmet, or not. I cannot recall ever seeing another "old man" walking around nearby, especially not one that looks as though he just walked of the set of "Shipwrecked"T'shirt, shorts, sandals & longish grey hair & an equally greyish beard. As I have said before, the local people do not regard me as an Alien but now almost acknowledge me as another, if somewhat strange, local.

SEASONS.Well the rain here, it would seem, has dried up again. The Wet generally runs between October/November & March/April. The rest of the year the rain is very limited which means, believe it or not, I have to 'hand water" the garden to keep it alive. Last year I was a little lax in this area & a great deal of the garden looked as though it had died. The onset of the rains, however, soon put that notion to rest & everything just took a new surge of life & everything is even more lush than before. It would appear that the plants don't die, they just go to sleep.
