State Teams / Wednesday Competion: Last year in Perth the State O/70 Black team played in the 'A' division on Wednesday afternoons, and went on to win the Gold medal. This was the idea of team manager Jim Wright, who not only thought of it, but got it properly implemented, and it must be regarded as an outstanding success. This year the concept has been expanded and both the WA 70s and WA Country 70s have played as teams in the 'A' division since August 12th. I hear that the State O/65s have played in the 'B' division also.

September 9th: The warm weather seemed to assist in producing some hot hockey from the State team, who put five goals past Blue (three to the Phantom) in the first game of the day. They did not concede a goal until the final seconds of their last match - against White, who also had a good day. WA Country certainly did not, frequent turnovers meaning that our opponents had the lion's share of possession of the ball. No attacking corners indicate that we hardly ever reached the circle. Ken Beer lurked around the post and popped in all three goals for the Whites. Player numbers were WA (15), Blue (13), WA Country (13) and White (9). Total goals scored (12).

September 16th: The State team were at full strength for the first time; both numerically and on the turf. They dominated the day with 11 goals for and none against. Only one other goal was scored (a good effort from Peter Blockley) indicating that much of the hockey was not as good as we would have liked. Stan Salazaar showed that he can pass the ball in the circle (I do mean the attacking one) but none of his gift-wrapped offerings were accepted. Perhaps we all need a break - or a trip away. Approximate player numbers were Blue (10), WAC (11), White (10) and WA (16). Total goals (12). September 23rd: The WA team were not supposed to be playing but actually provided a major part of the total numbers present. The scratch matches would not have been of much help to a severely depleted WA Country side, and probably not much good for the WA State team who took advantage of a great opportunity to execute skills while not under pressure. Only two goalkeepers had a run - Barry R has a cold, while Bill B has managed to avoid a repeat of last year's hamstring. Four games in a row on a 30 degree day is too much for me, and judging by our lack of run in the last, too much for most of my team mates. See everybody again after Cairns.

I must start with warmest congratulations to Les and the lads from Southern Cross on bringing home the gold in the over 70s at the European championships in London. Just wish I had been able to go over and play for the Alliance and catch up with you all but unfortunately the tournament coincided with a visit from family in Australia which obviously had to take precedence.

The visit of oldest daughter and husband was great fun and they were joined by our middle daughter (who lives in France) and our two grand-daughters, so we had a houseful. We went on several day trips to show them around and also went down to St Malo & visited Saint Mont Michel. Le Mont-Saint-Michel is an island community in Normandy, France. It is located approximately one kilometre off the country's north-western coast, at the mouth of the Couesnon River near Avranches. It is one of France's most stunning tourist attractions. If you come to France and have not seen it before, then make it a "must see."

On that particular visit we stayed overnight in a Best Western Hotel in the town of Pontorson. The hotel dated back to the fifteenth century and still had the original floorboards and central staircase. It had been beautifully refurbished and was an absolute steal at 85 Euros per night.

Game one Saturday 22nd August we beat the Netherlands team 4-0 in a convincing display of strong midfield mastery by Victorians David Sinclair, John Hamilton and David Webster (NSW). Notable performances were also put in by Pedro Hearne, Neil Patterson and George Bradbury. *The scorers were David Sinclair (PC), David Webster, Neil Patterson and Tony Cohen.*

Game two Sunday we played Alliance and won 3-0 at the alternative ground, a superior sand fill at a nearby school. The Vic pair and David Webster were once again outstanding as were Pedro and Les Waldon. We had issues with the umpire / officials who had ordered that no players wear caps where the peaks faced forward. Some wore them a la Leighton Hewitt but as the sun was so low in the late evening Les remarked he was playing against silhouettes when we went into the low setting sun. Colin Benporath played creditably against us and saved several goals. *The scorers were Pater Hearne (PC) and David Webster (2)*.

Game three we played on Monday morning at 9:00, our 3rd game in a row but won well 1-0 against a determined England LX. This was a really competent team effort. Coach Ric Roberts was impressed and played significantly himself, having only played in patches from the first game. *The scorer was David Sinclair (PC)*.

Wednesday we played the Dutch in the semi-final and they were a different team to that of our 1st encounter. Their tactics were direct; rough. They targeted all our players in an uncomfortably spiteful game and scored first then retreated to defending with eight players behind the twenty-three. Our goalkeeper just padded past the post a second potential goal with five minutes to go, then our Tony Cohen (NSW) scored from a lovely pass from Peter Murray who had played reliably well every game. So we went to one-on-ones. Four saved, we won 2-1 only clinching the game with the last shot by David Sinclair. Ric Roberts had scored the first threading one through a narrow gap.

Friday saw us play in the G.F. which we won 1-0 against a determined England LX team. Five wins, 10 goals for, one against (and one one-on-one). Scorer was *David Webster*.

Hard worked team, well coached, calmly captained by Les. Notable WA players were Pedro, Peter Murray (ever reliable), Les who played his best in the tough games especially the last, and George Bradbury who developed new understandings as the games continued. Neil P ran constantly and scored one goal. (I've heard that the goalkeeper had a great tournament also - Ed.)

I must salute the eastern staters who contributed so well, David Webster, David Sinclair, John Hamilton, Tony Cohen (our Chef-de-Mission), Van Richards-Smith (tireless and gutsy), Henry Barrie (75 and most positive), Bruce Fuller and the newly married Maurie Dobbin who still had plenty of dash each day. Wow.

The tournament was well organised, weather and locals friendly most of the time. A memorable carnival. Especial thanks to Marj Hamilton our manager. No doubt I've overlooked some, but not intentionally.
