<u>Whistle While You Work - Without Neil Mannolini:</u> Neil has had family visiting (and staying), hence has been super busy. So I thought it might be useful to include some advice on Control from the Umpires part of the Rule Book. The whole Directions to Umpires section is well worth a read, for those of you who have a rule book, or can access the full FIH rules online.

- a) Decisions must be made promptly, positively, clearly and consistently.
- b) Strict action early in a match will usually discourage repetition of an offence.
- c) It is not acceptable for players to abuse opponents, umpires or other technical officials verbally or through body language and attitude. Umpires must deal firmly with abuse of this sort and in appropriate circumstances issue a caution, warning (green card), or a temporary (yellow card) or permanent (red card) suspension. Cautions, warnings and suspensions can be given in isolation or in conjunction with another penalty.
- d) Cautions can be given to players in close proximity without stopping the match. Surely at our age we know how to behave properly, and it's high time we did.

December 7th: The Blue side continue to dominate, with their passing game a feature (and for any doubters, this includes Bob Bowyer and Terry Gaston). Red were the only other team to win a match while a below strength Gold side found things difficult. White trailed in all three matches, but fought back to draw on each occasion. Red were able to lend a couple of players to Gold, and Blue loaned Jim Malcolm to White, while we welcomed Julian Gardner up from Esperance again. Players who did not complete the day included Peter Gason, Ham D'Souza and Ivan Wilson - for varying reasons. Our behaviour was rather like the standard of our play, and fell away later. There were many volunteer umpires resulting in a lesser workload for all. Plenty of goals were scored, including three to John Ree, but the two I thought were G.O.D contenders were Les Waldon's and Bob Byers (both Red). Approximate player numbers were Red (12), White (8), Gold (7) and Blue (11). Total goals scored 13. December 14th: The dominant team for the quarter in Blue had a rare off day in the attacking circle. Their failure to score despite the customary midfield good passing resulted in three losses. Both the Red (won twice) and Gold (won once) sides were undefeated. Most of us found goalkeepers Tony & Colin difficult to pass - and where necessary their defenders helped them out with saves. The two I remember were Peter Stevens and Ken Watt. Though Graham Wood managed to get onto the turf in a Red shirt without being asked to display his birth certificate (where's Donald Trump when needed) and produced two candidates for goal of the day. Neither the standard of our play nor our behaviour seems to have improved and by the last game of the day everything was back to 'A' division normal. Ash Foster, Jim Banks, Rob Butler (welcome again) and Robin Bailey joined the Gold side for the day. Red employed a different strategy, using White players as fill-ins-to tire them out, then beating the White team in the curtain raiser to Knees versus Hips. Player numbers: Blue (11), Gold (6), Red (6) and White (11). Goals scored 7.

Statistics for 2016: In this WHM division (and probably the others also) the performance of a team is dependent upon its core players regular attendance. In 2016 all 'A' division sides have gone through one or more lean periods. Gold suffered most from this, and after a promising start to the year fell away in the second half. The current team list has 12 names, not counting Ian Lyon. Right now Stan Balding, Roger Jewell (long term), and John Milner are injured, while Gordon Thomas is absent. Red are formidable when their midfield includes Mal Horrigan, John Jeffreys and Les Waldon, but have been without at least one these players for much of the year. White did not do well until they picked up Ham D'Souza, while perhaps Blue have been the most even and consistent side all year, with Ivan Wilson the general at centre half. They also have several of the quicker players in this age group.

The goal scoring has been different this year. Only six players achieved double figures. The list reads: Blue - Peter Dennis, John Ree. Gold - Ken Walter. Red - Bob Byers. White - Ham D'Souza, (who got 43) and John Mercer. 5 players scored 9 goals and 8 goals were achieved by 4 players. In total 315 goals went in during 2016 - 29 of which were during the pre-tournament phase.

Where to in 2017? I believe that a small number of players may be moving up from 'B' division. This may help to raise the standard of our hockey and lessen the number of mistakes, which would make for a more enjoyable Wednesday experience. If there are fewer errors the umpires do not have to intervene as often, as shown in the Knees versus Hips match.

I think it is not very helpful when a team ravaged by injury continues for week after week with a maximum of 6, 7 or 8 available players - even if they all turn up. Perhaps a temporary transfer or two would be of assistance. But that depends on other teams having spare players.

Our whole attitude to umpiring needs to improve. I commented on this in the November 2016 edition, Colin Gee handed out a sheet from the 'A' division captains, and now has submitted an article, which can be found on Page 3 (read it now, if you have not done so). My personal view is that asking the same two umpires to do all six games is too much and the introduction of a small umpires panel, including competent player umpires, is a must. The last word goes to Shakespeare who has some advice to players who appeal for free hits:

"There is no need of any such redress. Or if there were it not belongs to you." Henry IV Part Two Act IV Scene I. (PS: I know this applies to me too. My New Year resolution is to do better. Ed.)

And so it came to pass. After significant fanfare (for a Masters Hockey match), interviews, TV, radio and newspaper appearances the hockey slugfest between the Knee Knockers and the Hip Swiveller's was held at Perth Hockey Stadium # 2 in front of one of the largest crowds to ever watch a Masters Hockey Game. Woody estimated the crowd at 500 whilst the more conservative amongst us thought that the 125+ (mind you 125 is not to be taken lightly) who attended were well treated to a significant game of hockey. The Hips won the contest 3-1.

Given that the teams had not practiced together, the opening term allowed both sides to look at their players and try and establish their best combinations. The Hips had been strengthened by the importation of Ric Roberts (Southern Cross Hockey supremo) and Bob Claxton both from South Australia both of whom showed a great deal of endeavour and were certainly worth the financial cost and effort of including imports in their team.

Knees opened the scoring after a strong move by Tom Long through the midfield onto the stick of the evergreen Masters Secretary Bob Bowyer, who tapped in for a goal past goalie Andrew Robertson, who had been forced out of position. This goal certainly gave the Knees a significant boost and they continued attacking toward their end of the ground. Hips not to be denied in the second term and were able to force a number of short corners. A well worked move by Jim Campbell passed the ball to Simon Thomson for the second goal of the match. Lo and behold first the Hockey Masters Secretary gets a goal and then the Hockey Masters President. (Perhaps this was set up by the bookies in Pakistan, one should check the movement of monies after this). The teams go to half time locked at 1-1 with neither team gaining control of the game. Perhaps the third quarter, the premiership quarter will give an indication of who will win.

Strong defence by Shane Knapp, Rob Tincey continued to hold sway. Gabes had a couple of good moves that came to nought when he ran out of space or ran into an opponent. At the other end Peter Evans was providing good trapping and passing skills to grab cleared balls from the defence and send them deeper into the Hips forward line. The midfielders on both sides provided the run and the ball movement throughout the game Jim Campbell and Simon Thomson for Hips and Shane Williams and Bob Le Merle for knees. Overall the game was an even contest with both sides having opportunities to score. Hips with their striker Jim Banks in good form taking advantage of their opportunities and as a result were able to hold the scoreline at 3-1 when the final whistle was blown.
