WA State Coaches And Managers: The WA Masters website indicates that most appointments have been made for the Hobart tournament. For the age groups relevant to WHM these are:

O/50s: Coach - Scott Macdonald, Manager - Paula Dick.
O/55s: Coach - Rob Lawson, Manager - Astrid Miller.
O/60s: Coach - Steve Pestana, Manager - Wayne Cutler.
O/65s: Coach - Jim Banks, Manager - Bill Campbell.
O/70s: Coach - Don Smart, manager - tba.
O/75s: Coach - tba, Manager - tba.

As can be seen, there are still a few positions unfilled, though I believe that Lesley Rutter looks like doing the work for the O/75s again this year. Congratulations to all those who have taken on these tasks, and it is very good to see several members of WHM included again.

Last year in Adelaide severe disruption was caused by the abrupt ruling that a team manager was not permitted to be a player also. I would expect two of the managers named above to play in the tournament also, and would welcome any information on rule changes for Hobart.

'A' Division Numbers: The winter grass season has now started and our numbers have fallen to the point where only one team did not need fill-ins on the 19th. As mentioned in the match reports this means 100 minutes of hockey for the replacement players, and two extra games is 125 minutes. We may need to consider a return to 20 minute matches if these numbers become a regular occurrence.

Hobart: WA State team nominations are now open. The WA Masters web-site shows that their trials are on Sunday 28th May, and nominations close at 5:00 pm on the previous Friday, 26th May.

Department of Health: Phil Anderson is due to miss a few weeks having cut his foot on a rock at the beach. Ham D'Souza had plantar fasciitis (look it up), but returned on the 26th. Roger Jewell has now had a complete knee replacement (second half of February) and begun the recuperation. From The 2017 Rule Book: The FIH rules include a comprehensive guide on umpiring. I have chosen to print the section on signals following on from George and Shane's session at Perry Lakes.

3.6 Signalling:

- a Signals must be clear and held up long enough to ensure that all players and the other umpire are aware of decisions.
- b Only the official signals may be used.
- c It is preferable to be stationary when giving a signal.
- d Directional signals must not be made across the body.
- e It is bad practice to look away from the players when a signal or decision is made, further offences might be missed, concentration can be lost, or this can indicate a lack of confidence.

4 Umpiring Signals:

4.1 Timing:

- a Start time: turn towards the other umpire with one arm straight up in the air.
- b Stop time: turn towards other umpire and cross fully extended arms at the wrists above the head.
- c Two minutes of play remaining: raise both hands straight up in the air with pointing index fingers.
- d One minute of play remaining: raise one hand straight up in the air with pointing index finger.
Once a timing signal has been acknowledged no further timing signal is needed.

4.2 Bully: Move hands alternately up and down in front of the body with palms facing each other.

4.3 Ball out of play:

- a Ball out of play over the sideline: indicate the direction with one arm raised horizontally.
- b Ball out of play over the backline by an attacker: face the centre of the field and extend both arms horizontally.
- c Ball out of play over the backline unintentionally by a defender: using right or left arm as appropriate, with the arm well below shoulder level, draw an imaginary line from the point where the ball crossed the backline to the point on the 23 metre line where the re-start should be taken.

4.4 Goal scored: Point both arms horizontally towards the centre of the field.

4.5 Conduct of Play: Signals for conduct of play offences must be shown if there is doubts about the reasons for the decision.

- a Dangerous play: Place one forearm diagonally across the chest.
- b Misconduct and/or bad temper: Stop play and make a calming movement by moving both hands slowly up and down, palms downward, in front of the body.
- c Kick: Slightly raise a leg and touch it near the foot or ankle with the hand.
- d Raised ball: Hold palms facing each other horizontally in front of the body, with one palm approximately 150 mms above the other.
- e Obstruction: Hold crossed forearms in front of the chest.
- f Third party or shadow obstruction: Alternately open & close closed forearms in front of the chest.
- g Stick obstruction: Hold one arm out and downwards in front of the body halfway between vertical and horizontal; touch the forearm with the other hand.
- h Five metres distance: Extend one arm straight up in the showing an open hand with all five fingers extended.

4.6 Penalties:

- a Advantage: Extend one arm high from the shoulder in the direction in which the benefiting team is playing.
- b Free hit: Indicate the direction with one arm raised horizontally.
- c Penalty corner: Point both arms horizontally towards the goal.
- d Penalty stroke: Point one arm at the penalty stroke mark and the other straight up in the air; this signal also indicates time stopped.

At least when umpires indicate the decision as above all players know what they are being penalised for. George Mullins and Shane Knapp provided an excellent example on Easter Saturday.

A' Division Blog: The saga for April. Many missed opportunities are unmentioned - no selfies.

April 5th: The temperature was down and the numbers were too. All teams had one surplus player with the exception of Gold. Red were nearer full strength with the return of Mal Horrigan and John Jeffreys but took time to settle, having their usual trouble in getting the last touch. Goalkeepers were plentiful, with Tony, John, Bob, Colin and Bill all taking a turn at some stage. Blue fared best on the day and Red worst - even when JJ banged one in for them White managed to scramble two in reply. Gold's attack struck form, with good goals to Peter Gason, Mal Jackaman, Ian Lyon and two to Phil Metcalf. Phil creatively avoided a hat trick by rounding the keeper and missing; while Ian L's reverse stick deflection was on track to be goal of the day until an off-the-turf hit to the top of the circle was first timed into the roof of the net by Jim Malcolm of Blue.

It was definitely not one of our better days. Below standard were our passing, our tackling and our sportsmanship. Comment included elsewhere in this edition of "Masters Matters" (Page 11). Player numbers were Blue (11), Gold (10), White (11) and Red (11). Goals scored (12).

April 12th: The day began with a general advice that umpires were instructed to give cards for all bad tackles. The effect of this lasted for a few games, but wore off. Keepers again were abundant with Bob, Tony, Barry, Colin and Bill all in action. As usual some good hockey was played as well as a lot of not-so-good hockey. Good goals were scored by Trevor Kerr (3), Ian Lyon (2) and Jim Banks but the goal of the day is again a split award between Ron Venables solo run for Blue and Bob Bowyer's crash into the far corner. There were several sitters missed, but the perpetrator of the miss of the day is fortunate that the MM Editor has instituted a strict no-selfie policy. In one hectic passage of play at the White defensive end it was estimated that 8 chances were not converted due to some great defensive scrambling by Barry Rutter and his cohorts. The results were very even with all sides winning one match. Blue's forward line seemed to miss Peter Dennis and only got going in one match putting three past Red. In other games Red's scoring difficulties were ended by Trevor Kerr's hat trick. Numbers were down, and filling in for a 25 minute game means one hundred minutes of hockey. We may need to bear this in mind for the future. Player numbers were: White (10), Red (10), Gold (8) and Blue (9). 12 goals were scored.

April 19th: Players are no longer attending in numbers, but whether this was caused by the school holidays, warmer weather in the Northern Hemisphere, or the change of venue to UWA I will not speculate. Two sides (Blue and Red) had good days (being undefeated), and two did not, with Gold failing to score and White getting only one goal. Both sides had plenty of chances, but poor finishes and good goalkeeping from Bill, Colin, Bob and Tony denied both forward lines. In actual fact White players scored three goals, but two of them were while filling in for other teams. Some of the hockey was OK, but a lot was nothing of the sort, and at times it seemed that the unfamiliar turf was beyond our capacities. Goal of the day goes to Rob Butler for sneaking one in from near the backline. It was great to see Bill Williamson back after a long absence due to injury - the grapevine claimed he got tired of telling people about it. (*Tell MM*). As a footnote, I believe that the Blue captain's email not only mentioned UWA, but had it in bold. Two of his team still managed to be late arrivals, due to the little detour to Curtin they both went on. Player numbers were; Blue (10), Gold (8), Red (9) and White (9). Goals scored (9), 4 by fill-ins.

April 26th: We found ourselves on the now unfamiliar surrounds of Turf 1, which appears to have a higher bounce than Turf 2 and we had trouble with this for most of the day. Both Red and Gold were without several of their normal prime movers, and the results reflected this with Gold not scoring and Red only scoring two against Gold. Blue again did not concede a goal while White only gave up one. This was scored by a White player playing for Blue. In other games White welcomed the return of Ham D'Souza who sparked the forward line into scoring a few. There were no draws and Blue won three times. Goalkeepers Bill, Tony, Bob and Barry all played quite well for most of the day but the absence of full backs Les Waldon (Red), Colin Gee (Gold), Len Blyth (White) and Phil Anderson meant that lots of scoring chances were created. Goal of the day contenders were Ken Beer, Jim Malcolm, and Ham D'Souza, but the award went to Ivan Wilson for a cracking corner conversion. Numbers were: White (12), Red (9), Blue (9) & Gold (8). Goals scored - 13. *PS: Turf 1 much better for recovery.*

The day was an unqualified success, and our thanks again go to Shane and George, as well as to Les Waldon who did the organising.
