<u>Western Hockey Masters (Inc.):</u> It is pleasing to be able to report that we are now an incorporated body as of August 7th this year, due to the hard work of Simon Thomson and Peter Murray. Many thanks to Peter for providing office facilities as well as expert advice and guidance throughout the project - and for this quote; "Now it's up to the Committee to make it work."

The Merger of WGMA / IHMA: I trust most readers are aware of the impending changes to the way in which world-wide Masters hockey is run. These are not generated by the existing administrations but are in response to a demand by FIH who threatened to withdraw accreditation unless there was only one organisation. Work on this has been in progress for quite some time now and a number of our Australian office bearers have been involved. At present the new body is to come into effect as from January 2019, replacing the current WGMA and IMHA. Though there needs to be some carry-over for the European Tournament in 2019. (New body is World Masters Hockey - or WMH).

I have been doing some reading on the various web-sites and found that the documentation is quite extensive. Possibly the best overview can be obtained from the WGMA website which is able to be accessed via https://wgmahockey.org. A wealth of information awaits you once you select from the home page the "WGMA Congress 2018." The minutes of the meeting have been posted online here, and may be accessed from 'Minutes." I recommend that you all read these, to discover exactly what is due to change, and how the process will be executed.

Only time will reveal what impact the changes will have on our rank and file hockey here in Western Australia. I have heard a few grumbles in recent years that our tournaments are becoming too bureaucratic, and that Masters Hockey has become a cash cow for Hockey Australia. I leave it to readers to form their own opinions, and as always, the proof of the pudding lies in the eating.

At one point we were assured that the two tournaments would continue on a split basis. To me this is still a topic of some concern, as all the information I have been able to access on the 2020 event only mentions two venues on an either/or basis. I would suggest that if this is the case then the Tournament Trophy section of our WGMA tournament (which is not a part of IMHA due to their much greater numbers) may not survive.

<u>Department of Health:</u> John Lindsay has become another one to have a cardiac problem resulting in the insertion of a couple of stents. <u>Paul Robinson</u> has been diagnosed with a problem hip requiring a replacement. This is scheduled for 4th September, and we hope that all goes as it should. <u>Brian Soares</u> was at PHS on Wednesday 15th during his rehabilitation. He claimed that the glass of red wine after watching the hockey was recommended by his medical advisors. Though he has had a lung infection since then, which necessitated a brief return to hospital. <u>Ham D'Souza</u> appeared to be in considerable pain with a back problem as he left the turf on the 15th. And it has been a tough time for the 'A' Division Red team. <u>Rob Andrew</u> suffered a leg muscle injury at Perry Lakes on the 18th, but made a good comeback on the 25th, <u>Roger Partington's</u> comeback was derailed by a sore knee and <u>Peter Murray</u> also had some muscle problems (both on the 22nd at PHS).

<u>Terrassa Team Numbers:</u> This was a very large tournament and a very quick glance at the fixtures showed that games had been scheduled on Pitch 8. Not all the teams who had registered appeared to have played, so my team counts are derived from the final results in each age group.

Men: O/35s (7), O/40s (15), O/45s (15), O/50s (12), O/55s (15). Total 64.

Women: O/35s (6), O/40s (16), O/45s (11), O/50s (16), O/55s (9), O/60s (5). Total 63.

This tournament was hailed as the largest international hockey event ever. If the 77 WGMA teams from Barcelona were added it would be rather unwieldy. Any reader feedback from Terrassa would be most welcome. I would very much like to know how a 127 team opening ceremony is run.

A function was organised for a post-game celebration and I am sure would have been very well attended. Well done to Aquinas for a fine tribute to a most deserving recipient. And very well done to Peter for 1,000 consistently good games. Ed.

<u>Masters Hockey Australia:</u> Some of you will be aware that Dean Lomax (WA Country and Australia) has taken on the Communications/Online role with what will be our new merged (Men and Women) national body. As all WA Country players would expect he has already had an impact - and I suggest you have a look at the new web-site. This can be found at www.australianmastershockey.com. As an example, the fixtures for Lismore/Ballina can be found on the site.

<u>Southern Cross AGM:</u> Those who can afford the air fares to Lismore / Ballina and also are interested in hockey travels in 2019 should attend this meeting. So should anybody else with an interest in the future of non-national teams international Masters Hockey. The date is Thursday the 4th October, time 3:30 pm and the venue is the Lismore Hockey Centre in the touch football meeting room adjacent to Pitch 2. As there is to be no tour in 2019 for the Australian O/70s and O/75s it would appear that competition for selection in the more senior Southern Cross teams is likely to be strong. I have not played for Southern Cross since 2016 and may have difficulty in getting from Ballina to Lismore on the day of the meeting, so I would really appreciate it if one of our WHM attendees could give me a briefing on the meeting discussions.

<u>Trans-Tasman 2019:</u> As per "Dates for the Diary" the venue is the Gold Coast and the playing dates are from April 30th to May 4th. Nominations are now open for players and officials, and the forms are available on the Masters web-site <u>www.australianmastershockey.com</u>. New Zealand has not yet managed to initiate national teams in O/70s and O/75s, and the site also has the news that there will be no 2019 tour for the Australian O/70s and O/75s. If I have any readers with more information on the reasons for no tours I would be very pleased to include them in the next issue.

'A' Division Blog: Three wishes for 'A' Division: better weather, better numbers, better hockey.

August 8th: This was yet another wet and windy day, with the customary impact on our numbers. We also lose several 'A' Division regulars to the state O/70s nowadays. The weather was actually fine for much of the time, and both the goalkeepers on the walkway padded up and joined the teams. Thank you to Bill Baldwin and Tony Marshall. Basically there were two teams plus at times up to five extra players. As John Lindsay has had a cardiac problem our umpires had to be drawn from these spare players, and after 4 games everybody decided they had enough, and the rain was threatening to bucket down. Ham D'Souza scored twice, Peter Eastlake once (with a little help from the defence) but the goal of the day was a shared award between Phil Metcalf (after a terrific reverse stick pass from Peter Murray) and Robin Bailey (on the comeback trail after knee replacement). Robin had a bit of practice before his successful shot. It was great to see apparently successful comebacks in progress from Robin, Chip Challenor and Roger Jewell. Player numbers on Turf One were Red (8), White (6), Gold (6) and Blue (6). There were several members of 'A' Division with the State O/70s on Turf Two also. Total goals (5).

August 15th: At last a Wednesday without rain and gales and goalkeepers emerged from their places of hibernation - we had no less than four. Gold (1) and White (2) have both lost players to the State O/70s, and given the length of the injury list for both (White especially) it is not possible for either to field a full side. The Red team are due to be replaced by the State O/75s as from 29/08 and hopefully the competition will even up a little. Some of the hockey was surprisingly good at the start of the day, but deteriorated as we tired, partly due to the number of fill-ins needed. At least we managed to complete the scheduled fixtures, for the first time this quarter. All the goalkeepers made several good saves throughout the day, keeping the tally low to the point where Gold were scoreless and White only managed one. Nevertheless some fine goals were scored, with 3 to Ian Hill, 2 to Ron Venables and good strikes to Ash Foster and Mal Horrigan (on the comeback trail) among them. Ham D'Souza is still having back problems and had to stop playing early in his first game. Player numbers were: Blue (10), Gold (8), Red (11) and White (6). 8 goals were scored.

August 22nd: The day produced two tallies of three individual goals in one game as well as several blow-out scores. This kind of thing will continue to occur while our numbers are depleted due to many injuries and the loss of elite players to the State O/70s. Red and Gold suffered heavy losses to Blue, and White were put to the sword by Gold. Several players had a great time in front of the net with tallies of 5 (4 Blue/1 White) to John Ree & 3 to Peter Eastlake (2 Blue/1 Gold) and Phil Metcalf. John and Phil were the hat trick scorers and probably should share goal of the day, while singles went to Ash Foster, Trevor Kerr and Neil Patterson. Before play started a player with a Gold shirt and a beard introduced himself to all present as Ken (Walter) - and he seemed to have got through the day without any further injury. During play Terry Gaston managed to lose the hockey ball, which was on the white sideline in front of him. I looked for the cameras filming a Specsavers advert, but could not see any. Despite all my moaning and groaning some good hockey was played (as well as some not so good hockey). Player numbers are maximums only due to some late arrivals and injuries, but all up: White (7), Red (11), Blue (10) and Gold (7). Total goals scored (14).

August 29th: The weather was cold, wet and windy (this line unchanged from the previous month), and the only team which had a full complement was the State O/75s. We managed to play a rough semblance of the scheduled fixtures (in a Red versus Blue it was 9 against 11 for most of the match) between the showers, except for the last match, which was not played due to the number of times that most players had filled in. The State team revealed some good combinations and passing, which were generally not matched by their various oppositions (who were usually playing in totally new combinations). Thank you to all umpires (Neil Mannolini, Neil Scaddan, Ken Watt and Greg Street for braving the weather. Thanks also to goalkeepers John Burt and Barry Rutter for joining State custodian Graeme Sansom in getting the pads wet. The player numbers based on the original teams: WA O/75s (11), Red (5), Blue (6), Gold (5) and White (5). Players also included 2 Queensland guests in John O'Donohue and Neil Sue See, who added (relative) youth, speed and class. Total goals scored were 9, with the classic deflection by Don Smart undoubtedly goal of the day.



Another end of season dinner is due after hockey on Saturday 15th. Bookings are essential.

We are coming to the end of another successful winter season. I cannot remember there being any less than three teams, though attendances during the World Cup would probably have been low.

Our relations with both YMCA and the Town of Cambridge continue to be excellent. Di Crocker has been a great help with our nibbles and drinks - so much so that we made a small presentation to her after hockey on the 11th August. An old dog can still learn new tricks.



We agreed that there was a good chance that our combined Masters tournament would be used in future to extract money for FIH. We also discussed the future of hockey for senior citizens, and decided that encouragement needed to be given to keep players in the sport for as long as possible. The Wellingborough (UK) seven-aside tournament in 2018 included one of (or the first one ever) the first events for O/80s and Jorgos threw down the challenge to eligible Australian players of forming a side to play there in 2019. Dates are from 12th to 14th April, so it would be best to combine the trip with a holiday. I am not going to volunteer my services as tour organiser, as I am still (a little) too young.

Future Tournaments: It is my personal belief that priorities are going to change, and that playing to win will become the only goal, and just taking part will cease to be. I would very much like to be proved wrong on this point.



<u>Winners Are Grinners:</u> As promised last issue here are the winners of the Tournament Trophy O/75s gold medal. I was not able to secure a podium photograph as the line of sight from the bronze medal position was not suitable. As can be seen, there are plenty of WHM players here. Congratulations to you all - especially on your wins over England and the Netherlands national teams.

2020 Tournament: I have been having a look at the possible venues. Tokyo appears to have only two turfs, while Eindhoven has four water turfs, one "semi water" surface and three sand-filled - eight in all. The logistics of a combined 200+ team tournament would be fascinating - especially the catering. Presumably the decision will be one of the first ones made by our new combined World Masters Hockey organisation. I am sure that Japan will have other auxiliary venues given that they are usually such good organisers and, as usual, will endeavour to keep readers in touch.

<u>What's In A Name?</u> If not a name, then what's in an acronym? It is hoped that the use of our WHM initials by the new organisation which will be running our World Masters Hockey (WMH) as from the 1st January 2019 will not lead to confusion. After all, we had it first.

How Many Going To Ballina? As long time readers will know, "Masters Matters" usually includes a count of how many WHM players are playing in the Interstate Tournament. Unfortunately this year, due to the loss of Dean Lomax to the Australian Masters web-master position WA Country has not been able to post team lists on their web-site. The State team representatives appeared here very soon after the teams had been selected. So we will have to alter the timing, and the MM reporter will need to bring back the tournament program and extrapolate from there. This will also make it a lot easier to locate WHM people playing for other states.

<u>Team Numbers For Northern NSW:</u> It appears that O/75s are much more susceptible to injury than the younger brigade. Initially it seemed that it would be a breeze to send both a State and a Country team, but since then almost all developments have been negative. In a nutshell:

Our more senior players had dreams
This year we would enter two teams (State and Country)
But now red alert
They're all getting hurt
Disrupting our West Aussie schemes.
