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<u>Perry Lakes O/65s No Play:</u> Due to the unavailability of Alderbury Reserve there will be no Saturday hockey on either 25th September or 2nd October. The reason according to the Town of Cambridge email is: "The Alderbury Reserve is blocked out during that period by our Parks Department for turf assessment and turf maintenance and it won't be able to be booked during that period. Alderbury Reserve has been identified as a priority reserve to receive maintenance and turf management."

WHM Expansion: Given the numbers of present and potential players in A, B, and C Divisions an expansion of the competitions is in order and will be discussed by the Committee. The possibilities include starting earlier on Wednesdays, moving one Division to a different venue, or one Division moving to a different day of the week. The change of day option could almost certainly be ruled out, as when A Division played on Tuesdays during a turf replacement at PHS there were quite a few players who could not make it. Unfortunately there is no chance that the proposal for a third turf at Curtin (from a few years ago) will go ahead. It is also unfortunate that whatever the final decision it is likely to lead to further fragmentation of our Wednesday hockey divisions. However, given the large number of current players it appears to be inevitable. There may be some comparable Masters' competitions elsewhere in the world, but there is certainly nothing like WHM in the rest of Australia. We are also one of the few hockey competitions anywhere to have played for most of the pandemic. MM's limeriscist comments on the growth of our WHM since it began in 1991:

A few years ago, so it seems (30)
Our founders had visionary dreams
What would it be worth
For games on the turf

Each week we now have 15 teams.

<u>Hockey WA O/65s:</u> The WA Masters Committee is investigating adding an O/65 grade for the 2022 season and has requested feedback from clubs. This may impact on our Saturday competition as players continue with their clubs rather than join our social matches. Hopefully the results of the survey will be known at some time in September.

<u>Wine Winners:</u> There has been a little comment about the under-representation of the B Division in those who take home a prize. This is exemplified by the figures in the third quarter (from July); which show that A Division players have had 19 wins to B's 5. Even though it has been a strange year, with usual high scorers Bill Campbell and John Mercer both conspicuously unsuccessful, this discrepancy is out of proportion. It could be caused by a failure of B Division players to come to the bar, or by their refusal to buy tickets. One theory circulating is that they do not carry any cash, and prefer to use the card for everything. That can be solved, as per the suggestion from MM's limeriscist:

It is not uncommon to see several players excluded from the pass-to list in a Wednesday game. Going back to the early years, here are some of the guidelines:

Rules For Competition: These were to be implemented by the team captains.

- a) Equal time All regulars are to be given equal time on the field.
- b) Captains to emphasise equal involvement of all players during the game try to cut out selective passing and the formation of cliques.
- c) Extra players are to be made available to teams which are short of numbers.

Nobody is suggesting that we should play to lose, but we do need to remember that we are supposed to be playing for enjoyment. On which note it was very good to see (on Wednesday 28th) several players give up the play after committing a breach which the umpire had not picked up. 'A' Division Blog: Green, White and Blue did quite well in August; Red and Gold not so well.

August 4th: The results were very unbalanced with Green being undefeated (three 0-0 draws and a 1-0 win), Blue with three big wins and a 0-1 loss to Green, while Red failed to score and conceded 5. Only 4 of the day's goals were not scored by Blue. August 11th: Results were again unbalanced with Red and Gold both having 2 draws and 2 losses. Green had a couple of thumping wins, but managed to drop a game to White who, like Blue only lost once and drew once. Gold's failure to score was not due to lack of possession, territory and circle entries as they more than held their own but could not buy a goal. Red seemed to be a little under manned and I understand that when he returns after a hamstring strain Lance Woods will join them. After Hector D'Rozario moved from Gold to Red for the day all teams had the numbers. Our four keepers Colin, Dick, Graeme and John played well again with several outstanding denials in one on ones from Colin and Graeme. Goal of the day caused much judicial debate and resulted in a three way tie between Steve McEntee and Neil Patterson's deflections and an outstanding solo run from the ageless (apparently) Ron Venables. It's good to have four keepers again (Dick, Graeme, John and Colin) and some better forward play in all teams made them work quite hard. The day's total goal tally was the highest for some time. Our expert judges awarded a joint save of the day to Graeme Sansom and David Evans for consecutive denials in the play of the same penalty corner. There were many fine goals, but the goal of the day was shared between Ken Walter (after an excellent cross from Peter Blockley) and Bob Le Merle (for a centimetre perfect corner conversion). A meeting notice, agenda and nomination form will be distributed in September and we will be asking members to book in.

At the moment we are getting ready for the summer season. The great challenge will be that we are implementing the Revo Sports system to register our members and we will all have to use it. This includes mailing list members who just want to continue to receive communications from the Saturday Committee. My belief is that anybody who has already registered on the system for any competition (including the social membership of YMCA which we all were supposed to have done) will only need to "Renew" rather than "Register". We will consult with Colin Gee, who has done a sterling job in implementing the system and make sure that you all receive correct advice on how to sign on for the forthcoming season.
