<u>Highlights from the WHM Committee Meeting:</u> The best place to find all the details is the minutes, which have now been circulated to all members. In brief:

- + The fees for 2020 have been set, and are unchanged from last year. In summary:
 - a) All players pay \$300 no allowances for sabbaticals, travel, etc.
 - b) New players pay \$350, which includes a shirt and socks.
 - c) Players who are over 80 on 1st January 2020 will pay only 50% of the fee.
 - d) All goalkeepers pay \$200. Unless they are over 80.

Next issue will include all the details on how to pay, and the banking details.

Note: This only applies to mid-week play at PHS. Saturday's fees are separate.

- + As in 2019 the fees for 2020 do **not** include **player insurance**, which is covered by the Hockey Australia levy. The Committee strongly encourages members to acquire appropriate insurance.
- + Casual rates also are unchanged and remain at \$20 for a day's play. The Divisional Coordinators have some discretion to vary them for multiple weeks or a single week for an overseas visitor. It was made clear that it is not our intention to **encourage** casuals.
- + Charity fund donations will be made to YMCC Junior Hockey (\$2,000), Salvation Army (\$2,000) and bushfire relief (\$2.000). It was advised out that Kalamunda juniors have obtained other funding.
- + Representative sides in WHM. It was decided that this practice can continue. It will be restricted to a maximum of four weeks. Team managers will be asked to pay \$50 for every non-WHM player.
- + A process has been established for the regular election / re-election of captains. This will be done during January each year. I suggest that those interested should check the meeting minutes.
- + The approach of summer has led to the adoption of a formal heat policy for our PHS fixtures. We will not run formal play when the forecast maximum temperature for Perth exceeds 37°. Players will be notified, and we will still conduct informal play but at players' own risk. Saturday's is on Page 6.

<u>Good Advice:</u> My apologies to Peter Andrews, who sent the following on to me some time ago, and also to the writer of the piece, Terry Parker. As I keep hearing about more cases of cancer, including my own, this story demanded to be in 'Masters Matters.'

"......the reason for my email is that I have just had a bladder cancer removed. It was 6 cm in diameter. I had very few symptoms other than a few issues peeing. I thought it was a typical enlarged prostate. I only went to the doctor on the off chance. I had an ultrasound which found the (large) tumour.

There's a 1% chance of men getting bladder tumours between age 65 and 85, prognosis depends on the cancer stage. I felt very fit and do a lot of walking, so it was a bit of a shock. I mention this because even being fit and healthy, it can be a silent killer (bit like bowel cancer).

My message is if anyone has the slightest doubt, get it checked. The ultrasound is very quick, diagnostic and relatively cheap."

As I've discovered too, that 'get it checked' message is so relevant. Ed.

November 6th: Most sides had reasonable numbers, with Gold having extra players again. White only started the day with six and after two (Peter Blockley and John Mercer) suffered incapacitating finger injuries were down to four. Thanks to John Ree for the prompt first aid, and thank you to all the players who filled in so that the day's fixtures could be completed. Gold had the numbers again, and until Jim Malcolm arrived Bob Robinson and Mal Jackaman transferred to Blue. Colin Sanders played very well for Blue, who were still without Ivan Wilson but they lost three close games while Gold and Red were undefeated. The results in summary: Gold (W2, L0, D1, F3, A1), Red (W1, L0, D2, F5, A4), White (W1, L1, D1, F3, A3), Blue (W0, L3, D0, F1, A4). The scorers were Blue Bob Robinson Gold Steve McEntee, Rod Spencer, Ken Walter Red Ray Domingo (2), Bob Maley (1), Colin Murray-Smith (2) White George Bradbury, Steve McEntee, Rod Spencer. Total goals (12).

November 13th: From my vantage point as a spectator the hockey quality seemed to be better than usual, then I realized that my absence was one possible cause. A pleasing aspect of the day was the use of short passes rather than repeated running with the ball; a style of play much better suited to the heat (36°+). Red were the team of the day, generating many opportunities for their forwards. White began with only five players, as most of their list is currently injured, suffering long term ailments, or absent for other reasons. The standard fell away as the afternoon progressed, with players tiring from the weather and the necessity to fill in repeatedly. The last match ended 0-0 but that was not due to a lack of easy scoring chances. The results in summary: Red (W2, L0, D1, F5, A3), Blue (W1, L1, D1, F1, A1), White (W1, L1, D1, F4, A4),), Gold (W0, L2, D1, F2, A4). The scorers were Blue John Ree Gold Phil Metcalf, Ian Purdie Red Peter Dennis, Bob Maley, Col Murray-Smith (3) White Terry Gaston, Steve McEntee, Peter Wallis (2). The judges conferred for a long time but eventually awarded goal of the day jointly to Col Murray-Smith and Steve McEntee. Player numbers were not too bad given the conditions and approximated: Gold (11), White (5), Red (8), Blue (10). The total number of goals scored was (12).

November 20th: The numbers were not great and neither was the goal-scoring at the start with the first two games both being 0-0 draws. The Gold side managed to lose each of their three matches by one goal, despite having a territorial advantage most of the time. The games they played in were the only ones where goals were scored; two 2-1 results and one 1-0. It was good to see four goalkeepers again, and I think the keepers appreciate being able to play behind the same defence in each match. The summary results: Red (W1, L0, D2, F2, A1); Blue (W1, L0, D2, F2, A1); White (W1, L0, D2, F1, A0); Gold (W0, L3, D0, F2, A5). Scorers: Blue Jim Malcolm, Colin Sanders Gold Phil Metcalf, Angelo Strano Red Colin Murray-Smith, Ron Venables White Peter Wallis. The judges had another difficult week and awarded a joint goal of the day award to Colin Sanders and Peter Wallis. Total goals scored (7). Player Movements: Welcome to Angelo Strano, who has just joined our ranks and been allocated to the Gold team. Ray Domingo and Hector D'Rozario have now found permanent homes, Ray in Red and Hector in White, while Steve McEntee has transferred to White from Gold to help cover for several long-term injuries and absences.

<u>From Saturday Hockey Masters:</u> With much regret the Committee cancelled play on 9th November. Swanbourne reached a maximum of 40° at 1:43 pm and under those circumstances we preferred not to expose our members to such extremes.

John Milner's comeback has finally occurred - he made a brief appearance on 23rd November and appears to be none the worse for his time out of the game except for being a little out of practice. It might not be too long before he starts popping them in again.

Due to the differing locations, with the sea breeze being a major consideration at Perry Lakes, we have adopted a different heat policy. Thanks to Les Waldon for leading on this one. In summary:

If the Swanbourne forecast early on Saturday morning is for the afternoon temperature to be 38° or above we will cancel play. 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<u>More Letters to The Editor:</u> Readers may remember the item in last month's MM complaining about the time allowed in a shootout being the same for O75s as for Olympic players. Here's a response:

"I have a comment on the penalty shootouts in interstate veterans carnivals. For O75s it's ridiculous to expect persons of that age to be able to score goals in the 8 seconds time allotment at present. The same applies to other "aged persons" groups. It's very difficult for internationals to score in that time, but they are super fit athletes. However, they are surprisingly able to do so.

I would suggest any aged group in the O/60's bracket and above should have the old penalty flick system reinstated. That could even apply to some lower aged groups too. It is a much fairer arrangement but, personally, I think extra time should apply first of all with a golden goal deciding the outcome of a match penalty flicks to apply thereafter if no result.

It has to be taken into consideration that aged persons have played a full game prior to penalty shootouts and the stamina is just not there anymore to run quickly from the 23 yard line, try to outwit the goalkeeper in the circle (who would've moved forward from the goal line, lessening the scoring angle and opportunity) and then try to score a goal from that more acute angle.

I think the whole thing needs to reviewed for older players. I speak from personal experience in 2016 (Adelaide) when the WA O//75's were beaten by the new system. It's just not fair by a long shot to win or lose out on a gold medal with international rules (designed specifically for young, agile and elite players) determining an outcome for old players.

OK, that's it from me. It's something that hasn't sat well with me since it was introduced. Incidentally, I'm not a great fan of the tomahawk shot at goal either. It's a very dangerous shot if not executed properly and, to my mind, is still a hit partially with the back of the stick."

<u>Another Letter to The Editor:</u> One dedicated reader has planted his tongue firmly in his cheek: "Our organisation should be cognisant of the needs of the general community by being politically correct in our practices and outlook.

- 9. After scoring a goal, there should be no cheering, whooping or punching the air as this adds discomfort to some players
- 10. "Competitions" be replaced with a gentler term such as "Gatherings"

These are suggestions worthy of serious consideration and should be adopted forthwith. By so doing, our organisation will earn the support and respect of the men, women and other members of our community." Eric Alcock

Whistle While You Work

Rule 9.10 (receiving a raised ball) continued: Stuart Burnfield raised this point initially and has been good enough to follow up the story included in the last MM and consulted John McGuckin. I have had a look at the video from the link below, which explains it all very well. So does Stuart in his piece below. Thanks to Stuart and John McGuckin for the enlightenment.

"Thanks Gucks, that makes sense now. It's much easier to see it demonstrated in a video than to puzzle it out from the written rules. It seems to boil down to these decision points for the umpire:

- 1. Take-off: Is an opposition player in danger? Free hit to defender on the spot.
- 2. In-flight: Is it likely to land in a contest? Blow it immediately in favour of the defending team.
- 3. Landing: The player who is in the best position to receive the ball must be allowed to bring it under control.
- 4. After landing, the first player to run on to the ball must be given space to control and play it.
- 5. If it's a 50-50 contest, blow it immediately in favour of the defending team.

In effect, 1, 2 & 5 boil down to 'danger'. 3 & 4 are almost like a free hit situation: until the player is able to play the ball from the ground, opposition players must give them 5 metres.

My question in the newsletter was about a player who is 3-4 metres from the receiver.

- A smart attacker should back away outside the 5 metres to avoid giving away the free hit.
- A ruthless defender might run towards the receiver to force the free hit for lifting into a contest.
- A wise WHM player might just lean on his stick or visibly back off a little, which signals to the umpire that it's safe to let play continue.
