Members need to remember when registering, that they must follow the system and only use the Registration button. As Western Hockey Masters is a new club on this system there is no data to drag forward as far as we are concerned.

When you follow the registration button, you must follow the prompts right through the process as most fields are requiring an entry of information to be able to proceed.

If you get an obscure request (contact WHM) or data is incorrect you may have to start the process from the beginning again.

Some people tell me they have had to have several attempts to complete the registration and others say it was easy and faultless. Please do not give up, have another go and follow the attached link."

<u>A Division News</u>: Thanks to George Bradbury for the following update. Much to the relief of some of us (at our age it's hard to become accustomed to directing passes at a different colour), it has not been a total reshuffle, but rather an adjustment aimed at equality.

"Having settled on a four team playing structure the next step was to re balance the teams. This was done against a backdrop of increasing player numbers post the Xmas period. Having 52 players there on Wednesday was gratifying and we settled on aiming for squads of 15/16 players in each team and up to 12 very regular players per week. Attention was given to the age range, skill level and the position mix of the squads.

<u>Blue:</u> Reduced their numbers to 14 by making available Jim Malcolm and Nevelle Brown but Jeff Kozak was added so back to 15.

<u>White:</u> Made available Steve McEntee and Lance Wood but Terry Gaston was added. The 15 person group includes Len Blyth (part time to other commitments), John Mercer (long term absence), and Peter Wallis (still returning from a knee replacement). This makes a 12 person very regular group.

<u>Gold</u>: Had its 11 regular member playing list reduced to 11 by the Terry Gaston move to White, but Jim Malcolm, nev brown and Lance Wood were added. A total of 13 likely very regular players.

**<u>Red</u>**: Paul Huisman was removed from the list *(thanks for helping out Paul - Ed.)* and Steve McEntee added for a 15 person group. With Bob Hotinski, Keith Kessell and Mal Horrigan returning from long term injuries a 12 person very regular group is likely.

**Comments:** No extra players are requested from B Division at this time but we remain in close contact. We are likely to lose some players through the 2021 season through natural attrition, which if similar to 2020 will be 6 or 7.

The possibility of an over 75s competition was raised again.

Thank you to the captains for their diligent, good natured & efficient running of the Division. Thanks also to the players for their willing participation in the playing, umpiring and administration of the playing days.

<u>'A' Division Blog:</u> Some re-allocation of players within A Division has occurred effective from the 1st February. Hopefully this will lead to more equality of numbers and results.

<u>January 6th</u>: We had insufficient numbers for two sides, so most players went down to Turf Two and were added to the B Division teams. This meant that all four Bs had surplus players. Team numbers in attendance for the original A sides were: Red (4), Gold (1), White (4), Blue (5).

January 13th: The 2021 season resumed properly, with numbers very much improved from last week. Thanks to the two goalkeepers (Barry and Colin) who remained in their portable sauna outfits for the first five games before calling it a day for Match 6. Dave Mellor was advised to have a light run by his cardiologist and had a go at playing for Red, while Jeff Kozak also donned a red shirt due to the numbers in B Division. Both had medical issues after a very brief time on the turf, though both seemed to recover quickly. We hope all remained good afterwards. Some of the hockey was not too bad after the Christmas break even though much of it was not. Sheer quantity as well as quite a bit of quality earned the goal of the day award for Ray Domingo. The day's results:

January 20th: There were no less than four goalkeepers following the move of Graeme Sansom and all enjoyed the luxury of games off and being attached to only one team. White's deep defence of Graeme, Peter Evans and Steve McEntee (with assistance from halves Scott, George and Robin) managed to keep a clean sheet even though the balance of the play was usually against them, especially in the game against Gold. Some good hockey was played midfield, particularly early on before the humidity tired players out, but many attacks broke down badly in the circle. The one blow-out happened when the Red defence decided to assist the Blue forwards to get the ball past their custodian Barry Rutter. Some very good goals went in and the short list for goal of the day is: Nev Brown (finished off an excellent build-up from Gold, with a great last pass from Phil Metcalf), Col Murrray-Smith (fine solo run for Red), Peter Eastlake (well-worked corner variation from Blue), and Ricky Watts (rocket-like corner conversion for Blue when no Gold defenders ran out). Ricky also made the save of the day on the defending goal-line against Red and suffered the worst injury of the day when struck on the upper body by the ball against Gold. The results were:

Goal of the day has to go to Ron Venables for a reflex shot to a bouncing and moving ball; Jim Banks deserves an honourable mention for a corner conversion; and Ray Domingo was his usual threat to defences all day. #### Bob Le Merle hockey bio

Hockey was something that I never thought that I would play for over 50 years, as back in school in India, it was boxing that I was more interested in and it was only the fact that the University that I joined had no boxing that I took to hockey. However, being in boarding school, one was obliged to participate in some form of sport other than boxing and so I reluctantly took to hockey with some semblance of success. Having completed my Engineering in 1968 I migrated to Australia and settled in Melbourne where once again boxing took over and I joined the Mordialac Boxing Club where I was coached by the then world champion Johnny Famechon's coach, Ambrose Palmer. Unfortunately (or fortunately) I only had one professional fight, as I was recruited by BHP and moved to the Pilbara to work in the development of the Mt Newman Iron Ore mine, and this is where my involvement in hockey was reignited.

Arriving in Newman in the very early 70's with a young family was something of an eye opener, as there was no sport or sporting facilities, and all one did was work six days a week and for most days it was 10 to 12 hours per day. It was soon realised by the Company that if they wanted to retain their employees (as the turnover rate was 28 days) they would need to provide some form of entertainment and so they agreed to provide all of the equipment and land for the establishment of sporting facilities and so was born, through volunteer labour all of the facilities that currently exists in the town of Newman including two fully grassed hockey pitches. It wasn't long before we had a thriving competition with five teams and regular visits from people like John Wright and Richard Aggis who provided coaching and support. I was a founding member of the Newman Hockey Association and represented Newman in the annual country week tournaments and at that time played mostly as a centre forward. In the late 70's I ruptured the ACL's in both my knees and moved from the forward line into full back.

In early 1981 I was transferred to Perth and as many of the migrants from India had done I joined the Harlies Hockey Club and played for them for the next 14 years. I was then transferred by BHP to Zimbabwe for a couple of years and played hockey over there for the Harare Sports Club. On my return I continued with Harlies until 2005 and was then fortunate enough to join the Wednesday Masters hockey.

After 10 years playing in the Wednesday competition I thought my playing days were over as my knees had deteriorated to the point where both had to be replaced. However with encouragement from Roger Davey I was back playing after a 12 month layoff.

It has been a privilege to play with a great bunch of guys in what is probably the best Masters competition anywhere in the world.

Thanks Bob for a most interesting read. I remember a women's side from Newman playing Country week at PHS and was surprised to see that hockey was played there. Ed.

## My Hockey Life - Robin Bailey

While I was at Kent Street High school, I played Football (unsuccessfully) and my older brother played hockey with some fellow students who progressed through to future State and Australian teams. I left High School at the end of 3<sup>rd</sup> year (year 10) in 1958 and joined the PMG as a Technician in Training the following year. I did not play any sport that year, but in 1960 I started playing hockey in the lowest senior side of the MYF (Methodist Youth Fellowship) Club. My brother had now taken up football! People I played with in the 1960's included Scott Blackwell and Jim Malcolm – and their brothers, and Harvey Davies. The MYF Club amalgamated with the PFA (Presbyterian Fellowship Association) Club to form the Uniting Churches Hockey Club with which I continued to play until the Club was disbanded due to lack of numbers. I then joined ARK's (Armadale Roleystone Kelmscott) where I played alongside Shane Knapp. When I shifted to Willetton in 1988 I joined Willetton and played alongside John Chapman, Bill Campbell, Buddha (Geoff Corlett), Keith Platell and Bob Woodrow. When the Willetton over 60 team folded, I, along with 7 other ex-Willetton players, joined Melville to play alongside Steve McEntee, Leo Welten, Geoff Riley and Frank Williams. Age caught up with me & I politely declined to continue to play in their over 60 side.

I joined the Wednesday Hockey Masters in 1998 as I had taken a redundancy from Telstra the previous year. The usual suspects were all there and are too many to list! I believe I started doing the Uniforms for WHM in 2005, taking over from Spider (Brian Lester), who was also the treasurer at that time, at the request of the then President, Simon Thomson – yes, he has been around that long! In all, I have played hockey every year since 1960 except for one year in the 1990's when I took a year off to fix a sciatic nerve problem.

I have played in 14 National Championships since 1998, 2 with the ACT, 4 with WA State and 8 with WA Country – and enjoyed all of them. I have played with the Alliance Club 3 times; the South west tour of 2005, Leverkusen and Amsterdam, again with a high level of enjoyment.

Why have I played so long? In the early years it was to get a break from work, night school and studies and over many years it assisted me in coping with the severe depression from which my wife suffered. When we finally found the right medication for her, I continued to play and enjoy the games, tournaments, international trips and the company of like-minded devotees. I don't consider myself an expert player, possibly more of a journeyman, who plays only for the pleasure it gives me. Luckily I have been able to continue playing after being diagnosed with late onset Type 1 diabetes (I am on insulin) and having a total knee replacement.

After joining the PMG in 1959, I started night school in 1960, completing my Leaving Certificate, which enabled me in 1964 to start part time at night school an Associateship in Communication Engineering at Perth Technical College. I was awarded a trainee Engineer position by the PMG which enabled me to study the Engineering course full time, completing it at the end of 1967. I then became an Engineer in the PMG/Telecom Australia/Telstra. Among other tasks, I was mainly involved with managing the installation of electronic equipment in exchanges to replace the existing electro-magnetic equipment and to cater for growth, and telephone traffic engineering. I was the head design engineer for the conversion of the Perth telephone network from 6 to 7 digit working in 1977. In 1974 I completed a degree in mathematics (at night school). After being generally involved with the switching of telephone traffic, my last Job in Telstra was to head a National data design group based in Perth where I had staff in Melbourne who reported to me. I enjoyed that! Thank goodness I worked for a communications company! As noted above I took a redundancy package from Telstra in 1997 as my wife and I had not found the right medication for her. Luckily we did after a few years, and that made her (and my) life so much better. Depression is an insidious disease I would not wish on anybody. /10

Both of us enjoyed it – apart from my being sent off for "deliberately" kicking the ball in our defensive circle. Such is the camaraderie in these carnivals that even the opposition commented that it was not deliberate and so I was unlucky to be sent off. I believe it is the only time I have been sent off the hockey field. Thank goodness memories can be faulty! I strongly believe that hockey should always be played in a disciplined and fair way. (I witnessed Robin's green card in Cairns and apart from the alleged kick occurring outside the circle he has described the incident totally accurately. Strange to say, that tournament was the only time I have ever been sent off too - but that's another story. Ed.)

Congratulations if you have got this far in reading the above. I am sure that your hockey story would be different, but hopefully it has been just as enjoyable for you as mine was for me. *Thank you very much Robin. We have all taken different routes to end up at WHM. Ed.*
