<u>Tokyo Tournament:</u> May 31st was when nominating countries and organisations had to finalise their team entries and pay the entry fee. Numbers are not looking anywhere near as good as usual and it appears that Covid is partly responsible. In particular the older age groups are at very low levels. Perhaps the quarantine requirements which have been in force for Japan until recently have also been a factor; I heard that quite a few players have withdrawn their nominations for the teams from Alliance, The former Tournament Trophy (now Spirit of Masters) competitions do not appear to be viable except for the O/60s, and social players who do participate may find themselves up against national sides. 
From Saturday Masters:

<u>Covid Protocols:</u> What do you do if you get the disease? From Hockey WA comes this advice: Hockey WA's COVID Plan is in line with the WA Government Level 2 Public Health and Social Measures and the WA Department of Health Guidance.

Following testing positive to COVID-19 or being a close contact as per the WA Health definitions; a person must isolate and follow all current WA Health protocols for Quarantine and isolation. For further information visit the WA Health website **WA Health COVID-19 (coronavirus)** In terms of hockey, the following guidelines apply;

Managing the infection and transmission risk

- 1. For Individuals:
- **a.** If COVID-like symptoms are present, people must:
 - i. Not attend training and/or any Hockey WA club or facility.
 - ii. Go for a PCR test or take a Rapid Antigen Test (RAT).
 - iii. Advise their club via their Team Manager or Coach of their test results.
- **b.** If a positive test is returned (either RAT or PCR), it is a government requirement to:
 - i. Register your result with the Department of Health.
 - ii. Isolate at home for a minimum of seven days or;
 - iii. until acute symptoms have resolved, e.g., fever, aches/pains, short of breath (if they have persisted beyond the seven days).
- **c.** If players are around club environments, it is advisable that all medical guidelines are adhered to. Players can consider returning to outdoor training, still observing social distancing.
- **d.** Due to the possibility that the infected person may still be shedding the virus between Day 8 and 10, Hockey WA prefer that players **do not return to indoor facilities or training** at any hockey facilities or venues, **until Day 10**. (provided they are asymptomatic at day 7).

On Day 10, if asymptomatic, athletes can return to all group, indoor and outdoor activities. There is no requirement to do a repeat RAT test before entry.

Managing the athlete's initial return to training post COVID-19

Once the isolation period is completed (as per WA health guidelines) the individual should contact their Team Manager or Coach to discuss the return to training and playing.

Returning to training and playing should be under the club's direction, in conjunction with the player and their doctor (if appropriate).

While each individual will experience differences in the severity and number of symptoms, a sensible graded return should be considered for all players. Return to training and playing, is based on the athlete's symptoms and exercise tolerance. It should be noted that some individuals may experience some persisting fatigue and cough for 1-2 weeks, affecting their ability to reach maximal exertion. There is NO evidence that maximal exercise in these first few weeks is dangerous, but instead, it may impact short term performance and possibly delay recovery. *I'd prefer not to get Covid at all. Ed.*

Another Well Done: It was a truism in my Apex days that if you wanted a job well done you asked a busy man. Uniforms officer Robin Bailey has been really working during the reorganization and I asked him for some indication of how many new shirts had been needed. The original order was for 81, and since then a subsequent one has been placed for another 36. All these have to be delivered to their matching players, which has been happening for the last few Wednesdays. Well done to Robin, who has been doing this job well for about 14 years.

<u>Life Membership of Oceania Hockey Federation:</u> This article from Hockey Australia announces the honour to WHM player Bob Claxton. Congratulations and well done from all of us Bob.



Devoted, astute and long serving hockey advocate and servant Bob Claxton has been awarded Life Membership of the Oceania Hockey federation (OHF). Life membership is the most prestigious award bestowed on an individual by the OHF.

As outlined in the OHF selection criteria for Life Membership, consideration for the honour is based on 'any person whose services to the organization of Oceania Hockey is agreed to have been sufficiently meritorious over a sustained period of time.'

Claxton's nomination was endorsed by the OHF Executive Board at today's Annual General Meeting. This latest recognition of Claxton, whose involvement in hockey spans over some 65 years, comes after he became a Life Member of Hockey Australia in 2020.

"This is wonderful acknowledgement of someone who has done so much for hockey in Australia and just as notably in our neighbouring Pacific countries," said Hockey Australia CEO David Pryles. "On behalf of the Hockey Australia Board and everyone involved in the sport in Australia, I congratulate Bob and thank him for his dedication and passion to grow the game of hockey and the wide ranging benefits that come with it."

"Hockey across Oceania is blessed to have people like Bob and it is terrific that the OHF has this way of recognising and celebrating the achievements of these people."

Claxton has been Secretary General of OHF for 15 years and been instrumental and a proven innovator over this time. Part of the lead management team of the OHF for many years, Claxton has been a mentor to all island teams and played a key role the hockey development of the Oceania nations, including in the officiating area.

Claxton has been a recipient of the FIH Presidents award for services to the International Hockey Federation (FIH) and OHF. He is also the father of current Hockeyroo Jane Claxton.
