#### **Tokyo Tournament:** Here is the latest update from World Masters Hockey's Ishbel Dickens.

"I am very pleased to inform you that despite some team withdrawals, the WMH World Cup in Tokyo, Oct 19-29 will go ahead as planned. We have 28 teams from 11 different countries, plus Alliance and Southern Cross committed to playing at what will be an amazing experience at the OI Hockey Stadium in Tokyo. Given the number of teams in each age category the competition format will be: O60 - all 11 teams (9 national and 2 Spirit of Masters) will compete in one competition; O65 all 7 teams (6 national and 1 Spirit of Masters) will compete in one competition; and All O70 & O75 teams, whether national or Spirit of Masters, will compete in one competition, with classification matches separated by age/category. Every team is guaranteed a minimum of five (5) matches, with most getting six (6), and some seven (7) depending on the number of teams/competition. Also, please be sure to let your players know that the three month visa they will be eligible for can start before the tournament dates and extend beyond the closing ceremony. Everyone attending the WMH World Cup on this special visa will be free to travel throughout Japan under the same conditions as Japanese citizens - wearing masks on public transport and in crowded places. Be assured that WMH and the HNOC in Japan are doing everything possible to ensure a very enjoyable and successful event for all. Do not hesitate to contact me if you have questions or concerns. Thank you to Southern Cross who provided this email, which I have included in its entirety except for one sentence regarding the documentation required to enter Japan. It is very sad to see the decline in the numbers of teams compared to the previous event in Barcelona. According to the newsletters at the time that featured 77 teams in total, including 9 Women's sides.


