<u>Tribute to Vern Gooch:</u> It was with much regret that we heard of the demise of the WA hockey legend and long term WHM umpire during September. Vern's son Michael Gottschalk has been a WHM player for quite some time. In lieu of a public funeral the family organized what Raema (Vern's widow) described as a commemoration party at PHS. In addition to some very palatable finger food and drinks the day featured a continuous slide show, the swapping of many Vern stories, and some VG chocolate bars (see below). The Hockey WA story does not mention Vern's major role in the start of Vets hockey in WA (Veterans was the original term). The Masters Matters edition for March 2014 quoted extensively from an article by Peter Kennedy entitled "How It All Began" which referred to a small post-season competition for O/40s called the "Gardie Marshall Day" and run by Suburban. This event became the forerunner of our Masters grades of today. At the time Vern was a member of the State Executive Council and began moving an annual motion that a Vets grade be formed. This was eventually agreed to "in 1977" says Peter K and as has been said many times since Paul Kelly wrote his song, from little things big things grow.

This story had a follow up in the April edition that year (2014) when Michael Gottschalk read it and gave me an article on the Gardie Marshall Day. He was the initial organiser and ran the event for several years until he moved overseas for a while.

Another achievement of Vern's which has never been equaled was to be the WA State team goalkeeper in a tournament where they did not concede one goal. I remember Vern saying that he had no chance of Australian selection after that as he'd had insufficient chances to shine.

<u>Tribute to Brian Lester:</u> Our long-serving WHM Treasurer died during September. Thanks to John Sanders for assembling these details of his hockey career.

"Brian Lester began his illustrious hockey career in 1957 at the age of 14 at Perth Hockey Club. He was in the WA State Schoolboys in 1959 and WA State Colts from 1961 to 1963 and played First Division hockey for Perth from 1960 until 1977. He was made a Perth Life Member in 1983 and continued to play for Perth and North Coast Raiders well into his 60s.

Brian's son, Travis, started as a Perth Junior and has played seniors and Masters Grades for Raiders. Grandson, Ethan Lester, has played since Minkey and Hookin2Hockey."

When Brian retired as WHM Treasurer in 2017 the December Masters Matters said:

"What is now Western Hockey Masters has received great longevity of service from its executive, with only two Chairmen and two Secretaries. However even this fine record is a short time compared to the Treasurer's job, which has only ever been done by one person. George Winning, who was the inaugural Chairman said that after the initial two teams (1991) had expanded to four a small committee was formed. This comprised George, the four captains and a Treasurer who as you should know was Brian 'Spider' Lester. He obviously did the job well, as he's continued in the role right up to this year, even after retiring as a player in 2014.

I would have needed a sound recorder to note all the adjectives used by George to describe Brian's work during this time. Diligent, scrupulously honest, effective and accurate all apply. As well as the finances 'Spider' must have been responsible to the playing uniforms for a significant part of this time, as he issued me with my dark blue Merrill Lynch shirt when I joined in 2006.

The quality of Spider's services to WHM resulted in him being the inaugural winner of the George Winning (Best Clubman) Trophy in 2015."

The family arranged a private funeral as per Brian's wishes and a well attended and organised public commemoration at the North Coast Raiders clubrooms on 29th September. Our sincere condolences go to Anne, Travis and all the family.

<u>'A' Division Blog:</u> The tournament has had its usual impact on our numbers, which have been very low in the lead-up and almost non-existent while the Gold Coast event is on. How we will fare after the event is yet to be seen, but I think that we will struggle - as is customary. In this instance it would be great to be proved wrong - how about it A Division?

<u>September 7th:</u> The first match was played with unequal numbers (Blue one short), but after that Mal Jackaman transferred from Gold to White and all sides played one short for the remainder of the day. It appeared that Gold dominated, but in reality the play was quite even, and the scoring was dominated by the seagulls (see scorers). Some of the missed goals had to be seen to be disbelieved. We were joined by Peters Eastlake and Galbraith from B Division, as apparently the numbers on Turf One were very high. In addition Alan Bryce played for Blue and Ken Eliot with White. Goalkeepers Graeme, John and Speed were hard to beat from the front, but seagulls often score from behind the keeper, and frequently did so today. Though goal of the day has to go to Nev Brown for a great shot from the right, with an honourable mention to David Horsley. The scores:

Team numbers (regulars only) at maximum on the day: Blue (7), Gold (10), White (6).

<u>September 14th:</u> The pre-tournament numbers are usually better than they have been this year and even with the same extra players as the previous week, we only had enough to select two sides with a few spares who were glad of a rest (I was, anyway). Goalkeepers Tony, Richard and Graeme might not have been. I'm told that the White team which began the first game included only one player who was not going to the Gold Coast in the WA Country O/75s. They had the major share of possession and territory but had difficulty in scoring. After that game teams changed every match and we only managed four before everybody had had enough. The judging panel decided to award goal of the day to the player who had travelled the longest distance and the winner was Alan Bryce for a well-hit corner conversion. The day's scorers and team numbers were:

Scorers: Gold: Nev Brown, John Mercer (2). White: Alan Bryce. The total for the day was 4.

Team numbers at maximum were: Blue (8), Gold (7), White (5). Plus new member Ken Eliot and the refugees from B Division in Peter Eastlake and Peter Galbraith.

September 21st: We were only able to field two incomplete teams, so the defenders should have had an easy day against 4 forwards. Despite the low scores such was not the case and goalkeepers Tony and John were quite busy, especially when they were the last line of defence for the Gold side. We still managed to play four 20 minute matches. White moved the ball around very well, but had trouble actually getting it into the net. Many thanks go to non-playing umpires Bob Claxton (who started on his own), Jim Balding and Dudley Burress. As Peter Galbraith arrived in a blue shirt he has been included in the Blue totals. The goal of the day judges did not have to confer for long, as Jim Malcolm's shot (cross?) from a very acute angle in the first match of the day won hands down. In a rarity the majority of the goals came from penalty corners, as normally we struggle to score from them. The day's scorers and team numbers were:
